TRAFFICKERS ARE **NOT USUALLY STRANGERS**

Traffickers often prey on vulnerable teenagers who don't have adults looking out for them.

It usually takes time for a trafficker to gain a victim's trust. Teenagers think they are making a choice, but really they aren't. The trafficker is manipulating them.

- Watch out for "new" friends who offer gifts, money, shelter or affection — it's not normal for people you barely know to be "extra friendly"
- Promising "too-good-to-be-true" job opportunities, relationships or adventures is another way they trap you
- Be aware of people asking you to help with random tasks like giving a ride to someone you don't know or recruiting friends to do weird work

What traffickers do to their victims

- Attempt to isolate them away from trusted friends and family
- Use threats or displays of violence to gain physical and mental control
- Recruit them to do unreasonable work
- Force them to work or perform acts against their will
